Dear New Town families,



This half term, Year 3 have been learning a lot about the Stone Age! In our art lessons, we have been focusing on how stone age people communicated through art. We've been experimenting with pencils and charcoal to draw some native British animals. We had fun using Modroc to create the texture of a cave wall. We got very messy! The following lesson, we sketched our animal onto the Modroc before we painted lots of lovely cave art using earthy shades!

Year 3 have also been working really hard in maths. We've been practicing the column method for addition and subtraction, and how to exchange and borrow across the columns.

As part of our art topic this term, which focuses on 3D art, Year 4 created shadow sculptures out of paper using positive vocabulary. When used in the sun, you can see the shadow on the floor! Hazel Class really enjoyed making and testing out their shadow sculptures, especially trying to figure out which way to hold them to get the best shadow!










This half term, in science, we have been exploring our 5 senses. This lesson was all about touch. We discussed what it would be like if we were unable to see and how we would identify certain objects. . We explored who Helen Keller was and what she did to help the deaf and blind. As a class we came up with words that we might use when describing things we touch. We had a bag of items with a variety of ways that we might describe them. Every child got the opportunity to put their hand inside the bag with their eyes closed and pull one thing out, once they had done this they had to keep their eyes closed and use some of our adjectives to describe how it felt in their hands!

We have also been exploring Mary Seacole and Florence Nightingale in History, and some still life drawing in Art!





Head lice Fact sheet

What are head lice?

- Head lice are small insects (no larger than a sesame seed when fully grown) with moving legs. They live very close to the scalp.
- Nits are not the same as lice. They are the egg cases which stick to the hair, and look like specks of dandruff.
- You only have head lice if you find a moving louse (not a nit). Your head does not have to be itchy to have head lice.



How do you get head lice?

- Because of children's play activity and close contact, head lice are usually found on children, but can also spread to adults.
- Head lice are caught from close family and friends in the home and community, as well as at school.
- Head lice live in all types of hair -- dirty or clean, short or long.
- Head lice walk from one head to another, when heads are close together – they do not fly, jump or swim.

How can you prevent head lice?

- Regular brushing and combing of the hair will help to spot lice early.
- The best way to stop the spread of head lice is for families to check their heads by regular wet combing using detector comb.
- Human head lice are not found on animals or household pets and are not transmitted from pets to humans.

How do you treat head lice?

Do not treat unless you are sure you have found a moving louse.

- Check and treat all infected members of the family.
- Ask your GP or Pharmacist which head lice treatment to use.

 Creme rinses and shampoos are not thought effective and are therefore not recommended.

 The Pharmacist can advise on any evidence of resistance to treatment and therefore the most appropriate treatment to purchase. Also, the Pharmacist can advise on treatments suitable for people with asthma and other respiratory conditions.
- Always read and follow the instructions in the treatment pack.
