	Learning at school	Learning at home
English	This term in English we will be centring our writing around the book The Water Tower by Gary Crew. We will be learning how to build atmosphere and suspense within narrative settings and how to embed speech effectively to develop character and move plot along. Once all of these elements are secure, we will be writing our own atmospheric stories. We will continue to revise our grammar, punctuation and spelling knowledge and accuracy in preparation for the sats tests. During reading lessons, we will continue to work on comprehension skills and how to clearly explain our understanding of a text.	<ul> <li>Challenge yourself to explore chapter books, either by yourself, with an adult or sibling.</li> <li>Listening to the news: can you bring in an interesting news item to present to the class?</li> <li>Read a book from your bookshelf at home/library. Write a short book review outlining what the book was about, what you liked about the book and why you would recommend it to others.</li> </ul>
Maths	To begin the summer term, Year Six will be focussing on areas of the curriculum that need revising before SATS. We will continue to practise arithmetic methods daily as well as look at more complicated reasoning questions and how we interpret them. Once we have completed the SATs, Year 6 will complete themed projects, allowing them to apply their learning to 'real life' situations.	<ul> <li>Maths facts are essential for your SATs! #### Topic

This term we will be learning about The Early Islamic Civilisation. We will look at the history of the region, focusing on Baghdad during its golden era. In geography we will be finding out about natural resources which can be found in the UK and across the world and looking at how that affects trade between nations. In our science lessons we will be looking at light and finding out how light travels and how we see. In art we will be looking at sculptures around the theme of making memories. In PE we will be practising our athletic skills in order to get ready for sports day as well as enjoying some cricket. In art we will be taking inspiration from African masks in order to prepare for our end of year production as well as learning about contemporary African artists. In RE we will learn about how faiths contend with ethical questions and how scripture guides actions. In D&T we look forward to finding out about street food.

- You could look up some traditional Asian stories to read and learn together
- Visit the Cole Museum of Zoology to see some specimens.
- Use the internet to research our topics, and make notes about facts you have found out.
- Tell your family about what you have been learning! Can you create a mini museum which you add information to each week?
   Put 'for children' after your search topic and use search engines such as Swiggle, Kid Rex or Safe Search UK to keep children safe and bring up appropriate information.

#### **Reading Expectation**

All children should be reading at home at least four times per week and brought into school every day.

Parents/carers should be <u>signing reading records at least four times per week</u> to show when reading has been done.

# Some questions to ask your child while reading together

- Look at the front cover. What could the book be about?
- Who is the author?
- What is an illustrator? What do they do?
- What does that word mean? Read the words around it to help you figure it out (context)
- How can you read an unfamiliar word? Can you use your Fred talk and then blend?
- Who are the main characters in the story?
- What do you think will happen next?
- How do you think that character feels? Why? How would you feel in that situation?
- Can you predict how the book will end?
- Who is your favourite character? Why?
- Is there a hidden message in the story? What is it?
- Can you retell the story in your own words?
- Do you like how the story ended? Can you think of another way the book could have ended?
