	Learning at school	Learning at home
English	In the Summer Term for Year 2, our focus will continue to improve our reading and writing abilities through regular participation in phonics sessions. Additionally, we'll engage in crafting narratives and non-fiction pieces inspired by our chosen topics or captivating books like A Walk in London to inspire us to write instructions, persuasive posters and diary entries! We'll also write fantasy setting descriptions based on Toys in Space. Encouraging discussion and drama, we aim to enrich our vocabularies. In our daily reading lessons, we'll practice retrieving and documenting information while honing our skills in inference and prediction. Each day concludes with the pleasure of listening to our teacher read a carefully selected children's classic chapter book.	 Reading is an important skill for life! You should read a book together with an adult or a sibling at least four times a week and record this in your reading record. You can read a book from school, from home or the local library. Remember to bring in your reading record each day so it can be checked by your teacher. Learn the spelling rule for the week and practise the spellings. Speak to your teacher for fun ways you can practise your spellings. Remember a little bit each day makes a big difference!
Maths	Our focus in mathematics this term will be on measurement, fractions, time, statistics, position and direction. This will include examining length and height with real objects and surrounding environments, as well as a comprehensive examination of mass, capacity and temperature applied to real-world uses such as cooking, travel and decorating. Our learning will also look at refining our abilities in measuring. As we progress, we'll use reasoning and problem-solving strategies to challenge ourselves. Our fractions learning will look at recognising and finding halves, a quarter, a third and three quarters.	 Continue learning and practising your times tables facts using Times Tables Rockstars. Confident mathematicians are able to recall key mathematical facts quickly. Use your maths knowledge every day! Count in 2s, 3s, 5s and 10s, Read the clocks at home Practise measuring different lengths/heights/weights around the house and talk about the different shapes you can see around you.
Our topic work	During this term, we will use simple fieldwork and observational skills to study the geography of our school and its grounds and the key human and physical features of its surrounding environment. We will use aerial photographs and plan perspectives to recognise landmarks and basic human and physical features around us; devise a simple map; and use and construct basic symbols in a key. In history , we will study a range of great explorers. We will learn how the Wright brothers changed the world and why we still remember Amelia Earhart. We will investigate how hard it is to journey to the South Pole.	 Complete your topic-based homework each week to build on the knowledge and skills gained from your learning in the classroom. While a general suggestion has been given on how to complete the homework, you can present your work as creatively as you want. Your homework this year, has been great so we can't wait to see what you come up with! Remember to bring it in on Wednesdays. Use your Knowledge Organiser, the internet or visit the local library to research our topic and make notes about what you have found out. Remember to put 'for children' after your search and use safe search engines such as Kid Rex or Safe Search UK to bring up ageappropriate information.

Reading Expectation

All children should be reading at home <u>at least five times per week</u>. Books should be brought into school <u>every day</u>.

Some questions to ask your child while reading together

- Look at the front cover. What could the book be about?
- Who is the author?
- What is an illustrator? What do they do?
- What does that word mean? Read the words around it to help you figure it out (context)
- How can you read an unfamiliar word? Can you use your Fred talk and then blend?
- Who are the main characters in the story?
- What do you think will happen next?
- How do you think that character feels? Why? How would you feel in that situation?
- Can you predict how the book will end?
- Who is your favourite character? Why?
- Is there a hidden message in the story? What is it?
- Can you retell the story in your own words?
- Do you like how the story ended? Can you think of another way the book could have ended?

Parents/carers should be <u>signing reading records at least five times per week</u> to show when reading has been done. Reading records should be brought into school <u>every day.</u>



Reading tracker and competition
