Our Learning: Year 6 - Autumn Term 2026

	Learning at school	Learning at home
English	This term we will start off by using <i>The Arrival</i> by Shaun Tan as a stimulus for writing. We will write letters, diaries and a narrative using the text. We will then use <i>The Promise</i> by Nicola Davies as a stimulus, continuing to develop our writing skills through a range of writing. We will use our comprehension lessons to retrieve and record information and develop understanding through inference and prediction. We aim to read the novels <i>Anglo-Saxon boy</i> and <i>Letters from the Lighthouse</i> to underpin our knowledge of the history topics studied. There will be a continued emphasis on embedding handwriting, spelling, and punctuation and grammar skills in all our writing. On a daily basis, we will dedicate some time to reading our class book to create a community of readers.	• Challenge yourself to explore chapter books, either by yourself, with an adult or sibling. • Listening to the news: can you bring in an interesting news item to present to the class? • Read a book from your bookshelf at home/ library. Write a short book review outlining what the book was about, what you liked about the book and why you would recommend it to others.
Maths	We will start off the year by extending our knowledge about place value, which will include whole numbers to ten million, negative numbers, a revision of Roman numerals and decimals. We will look at mental calculation strategies and embed column addition, subtraction and multiplication and division, moving on to learning how to carry-out long division. There will be a big emphasis on being able to do arithmetic quickly and applying the maths we know to reason and solve problems. We will continue on to working with fractions, consolidating all previous learning on this topic and finally end the term with converting units of measurement.	• Maths facts are essential for your SATs! Please practice your times tables, associated division facts and number bonds to 100 regularly. Remember, great mathematicians know these as quick fire facts so they can apply them to problems. • Ask questions about how maths is used in everyday life – time, cooking, money and change. Collect examples to share with the class.

Our topic work	In history we will focus on the power struggle for the throne in 1066. We will look at why Britain was an attractive target for the Vikings and consider what sources tell us about how the Vikings were viewed by the Anglo Saxons. We will look at Alfred the Great and consider his role in the power balance at the time then look at the consequences of Edward the Confessor's death and how it changed the course of history. In the second part of the term we will move onto World War Two and its impact on Britain. We will look at the turning point during the war and how victory was achieved by the allies as well as how childhood changed during this period. In art we will be exploring life and anatomical drawings in order to develop our practical skills, as well as studying the preparatory drawings and sketchbooks of Leonardo Da Vinci. In science, Year 6 will be learning about electricity. We will be building and testing circuits with increasing complexity. The children will extend their understanding of ways in which the brightness of bulbs or speed of motors in a circuit can be changed. In French we will be learning about how to talk about school and the subjects we enjoy. In RE we will be learning about the key beliefs in Hinduism, Buddhism and Islam with a focus key areas of belief. During PE lessons we will be developing our skills through gymnastics and tag rugby.	• Research Hinduism, Buddhism and Islam by reading up about the these religions. • Find out what you can about the Battle of Hastings using books and safe online searches. • Go to the library or use the internet to research our topics and make notes about facts you have found out. • Find out what is powered by electricity in your house. Which appliances use the most and the least electricity? What are the best ways to conserve electricity at home? Put 'for children' after your search topic and use search engines such as Swiggle, Kid Rex or Safe Search UK to keep children safe and bring up appropriate information.
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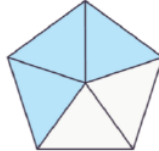
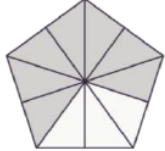
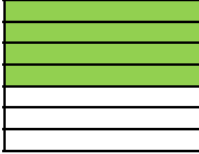
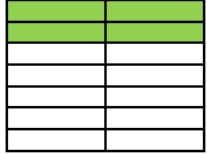
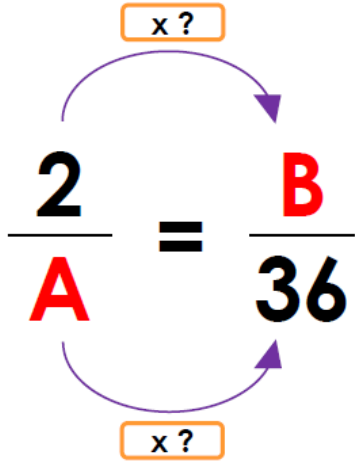

Reading Expectations

All children should be reading at home **at least five times per week** and reading books and reading records should be in school **every day**. Reading books should be with your reading records and placed on your desk daily.

Parents/carers should be signing reading records at **least five times per week** to show when reading has been done. Parents can sign reading records to show any books that have been read or read to the children at home however, children must prioritise their school reading book.

Reading tracker and competition

We are continuing to run our whole school reading competition with prizes for those who show their dedication to reading. Teachers will be tracking daily how many times pupils in their class have their reading records signed ensuring they are meeting the five times per week expectation. These figures are then added to our reading race board and the class that has their reading records signed the most in a term wins the reading trophy and an extra 15 minutes playtime!

Some questions to ask your child while reading together

- Look at the front cover. What could the book be about?
- Who is the author?
- What is an illustrator? What do they do?
- What does that word mean? Read the words around it to help you figure it out (context)
- How can you read an unfamiliar word? Can you use your Fred talk and then blend?
- Who are the main characters in the story?
- What do you think will happen next?
- How do you think that character feels? Why? How would you feel in that situation?
- Can you predict how the book will end?
- Who is your favourite character? Why?
- Is there a hidden message in the story? What is it?
- Can you retell the story in your own words?
- Do you like how the story ended? Can you think of another way the book could have ended?

On-line Times Tables Challenge- TT ROCKSTARS

Having a really secure knowledge of times tables facts provides the foundation for the understanding of numerous mathematical concepts.



'TT Rockstars' is a highly engaging, on line tool designed to help children progress with rapid recall of tables facts through regular questions tailored to their individual needs.

As part of the weekly homework there will be an expectation for children to log on to TT Rockstars for 5 minutes, 4 times a week to practise their times tables facts.
